

What can deliberative democracy do for trust in expertise?



Our colleague <u>Cathrine Holst</u> (University of Oslo) has published "Deliberative Systems Theory and Citizens' Use of Online Media: Testing a Critical Theory of Democracy on a High Achiever", coauthored with Hallward Moe (University of Bergen).
